
Over 300 years ago Edward Harvy of North Hill wrote his last will and testatment. It's interesting but difficult to read because of the handwriting. The will, inventory and accounts have been typed out here to give you a feel for life in early eighteenth century North Hill.



Edward Harvy lived in North Hill for his entire 50 years. On the 2nd of April 1720, recognizing that his life was coming to a close, Edward prepared his will. A legal scribe recorded his wishes and you can see Edward's signature and seal above, on the third image of the top row. He was buried in St Torney's churchyard on the 5th of April, just three days later.

#### The Will

The will has been faithfully transcribed using the spelling, grammar and punctuation in use at the time.

There are seven parts to this document which can be seen above. The second and third images on the top row are Edward's signed will in which he appoints the executors of his effects:

"... I Request Desire and Appoint my father law Peter Hurdon & my uncle Henry Coumbe To be ye Joynt and Equall Executors and Trustees of This my last will and Testament..."

The fourth document in the top row is the inventory of Edward's belongings; this list was made on the 12th of April 1720 by John Budge and William Wevill.

Armed with the will and the inventory his executors, his 'father-in'law' Peter Hurdon and Uncle Henry Coumbe, approached the office of the Archdeacon in St Neot and were granted authority (probate) to enable them to distribute Edward's effects in accordance with his wishes. In those days it was the church, and not the state, that controlled matters of probate. The authority is the first document on the top row and formed part of a wrapper in which all the paperwork was contained.

Edward's estate exceeded £390 and this meant that there were taxes to pay. Tidying up his financial dealings, his executors compiled a list of debts and credits which can be seen in the second and third documents on the lower row. These accounts modified the value of the estate and potentially, therefore, the tax. Part of the list of credits shows people who bought items from the estate; this would have been necessary for the executors to make cash payments to the beneficiaries.

In the name of God Amen Aprill ye Second one Thousand Seven Hundred and Twenty I Edward Harvy of The parish<sup>1</sup> of Northill in ye County of Cornwall yeoman being weake & sick of Body but of sound and senceably memory Thanks be to Almighty God for it doe make and ordaine This my Last Will and Testament in mannor & fourm following

Imprimis<sup>2</sup> I Give and bequeath my soule to Almighty God my maker and Redeemer and my Body to be buried in Christian buriall<sup>3</sup>

Item I Give & bequeath unto Grace Harvy my Wife one bed performed one brass pott one brass pan with ye use of any other of my goods as Long as she shall Continue a widow & unmaried and I also Desire and Impower her ye said Grace to be an overseer and Trustee over my Children as long as she shall Continue a widdow<sup>4</sup>

Item I Request Desire and Appoint my father [in]<sup>5</sup> law<sup>6</sup> Peter Hurdon & my uncle Henry Coumbe To be ye Joynt and Equall Executors and Trustees of This my last will and Testament and to pay my Debts & Legacies & funerall Expences and to manage my Estates now in being in Trughill Quarry park, Dealstone; & Penhole<sup>7</sup> after ye Death of Grace my Wife and to make The best benifite profitt and Advantage of it and of my goods

That They and ye survivour of Them ye said Peter Hurdon and Henery Coumbe and his & Their Exors may make to & for ye payment of my debts & ye maintainance of all my said Children That is to say Edward John William & Mary<sup>8</sup> before They ye said Children Shall Accomplish ye full age of one and Twenty years of old and at ye Time to make an Equall Dividend of all my substance Then Left in Their Hands according to Their skill & Judgment & ye same to pay and Deliver over to Them that Then survive Equally Except to ye Eldest of my aforsaid sons Then surviving to have Twenty five pounds more than any one of ye Rest of my Children

And my Will and Desire is that ye Child in my wifes wombe<sup>9</sup> and now unborn may have an Equall share with ye Rest Abovenamed Except ye Eldest sone as Above named

And I also Desire and Appoint William Wevill my wife's brother<sup>10</sup> and William Harvy my brother to be helpfull Aiding & Assisting unto ye said Peter Hurdon and Henry Coumbe in ye Executing of This my last Will and Testament

### Page 2 of the will

And my Will and Desire farther is That if ye said Peter Hurdon and Henry Coumbe or Either of Them shall Happen to be Taken sick that They Shall hereby be fully Impowered to Chuse<sup>11</sup> and Elect any other person that they or ye survivour of Them shall think fitt and proper to be an other Trustee Gaurdian and overseer in ye Roome of ye party Deceased To see this my Last Will and Tesatment fully Executed according to the True Intent & meaning hereof

<sup>1</sup> The script of the time used commonly understood abbreviations. The 'ar' or 'er' following a 'p' as in 'parish' or 'performed' were omitted and appear as 'pish' or 'pformed' in the will. The missing letters have been included here in *italics*.

<sup>3</sup> This is a very shortened introduction to a will. Many earlier wills had long introductions but this was beginning to become less common. The introduction to a will was, and had been for centuries, the last and highly important opportunity for a testator to declare their capability to make these final decisions, express their trust in God and declare their allegiance to the Crown. An example of this can be seen in the 1715 will of Richard Spoure, son of Henry Spoure of Trebartha Hall in North Hill "... In the Name of God Amen I Richard Spoure of Grays Inn in the County of Middlesex Gent do this third day of March in the Second yeare of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George by the Grace of God of Great Britain France and Ireland, King Defender of the faith etc. and in the yeare of our Lord Seventeen hundred and fifteen make this my last Will and Testament as followeth First I give my Soul unto the hands of the Almighty God Trusting by the merits of my Saviour and Redeemer Jesus Christ to receive a Glorious Resurrection to life immortal my Body I leave to the Earth to be decently buryed in the parish of St Andrew Holborn with a charge not exceeding the Summe of Twenty and Five pounds ..."

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Imprimis is Latin for "First of all".

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup> This clause seems to infer that Grace may not have been the mother of all of the children and perhaps Edward had married her as a widower, having had a child or children with his first wife.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>5</sup> Text that is not in the original will but has been added to help understanding is shown in square brackets, e.g. [in]

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>6</sup> The use of "in law" in relationships shown as father-in-law or daughter-in-law was not as defined as it is used today. Father-in-law, for instance, may mean stepfather or some other relationship. The same applies to daughter-in-law which could mean, for instance, the daughter of a spouse's previous marriage or the wife of a son.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>7</sup> Trughill, Quarry Park, Dealstone & Penhole are tenements or parts of tenements in North Hill and Linkinhorne parishes

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>8</sup> The eldest of the children, Mary, was about 7 years old when Edward, her father, died. The youngest child, William, was just over two years old.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>9</sup> This unborn child was baptised as Grace Harvy in October 1720 at St Torney's.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>10</sup> If Edward's wife's brother is William Wevill then she would have been born as Grace Wevill. It is probable that their father was Edward Wevill, making him the testator's father-in-law. The reference to Peter Hurdon being a father-in-law is an epithet that local people would have understood but does not meet present day definition of the term (see note above)
